Rector's Message

Dear Saints of James,

A flock of geese flew honking over Kanuga Lake, a dark V formation against the gray clouds that hung so low that they shrouded the tops of the pine trees in the early morning light. Anyone up early, drinking coffee on the porch of our cottages, by the edge of the lake, would have been a part of this picture of calm quiet punctuated by the sounds of nature. This is the setting of the Vestry & Parish Leader's conference that 11 people attended at Kanuga Episcopal Conference Center in early January. This year's conference on *Uncovering our Strengths for the 21st Century*, featured the Rt. Rev. Mark Dyer and Dr. Amelia Dyer as key note speakers, and was coordinated by two of the staff from Epiphany Institute in Hickory, NC.

Joining 12 other parishes from the Southeastern states, we gathered together for presentations on ministry in the 21st century and then had time to meet as a parish group to do our own planning. The most important and hopeful thing I heard was, "The small Episcopal church in particular, is perfectly poised to meet the needs of the 21st Century people." Described as, 1) socially inclusive (care for all sorts and conditions) 2) liturgically formed (historically & spiritually 3) spiritually focused (embracing mystery, educational commitment 4) theologically grounded (our famous 3-legged stool), the Episcopal church that we know at St. James seems to fit this profile. We know that we can not be all things to all people, but we can look at the gifts and talents that God has given to the people of St. James, and know that we as the Body of Christ can serve God in this place and in the world. Our mission and ministry needs to generate from the strengths, gifts and assets of our parishioners. As we individually grow spiritually and continue to strengthen our relationships with each other, who knows how God will work in our lives and in our parish, to fulfill his purposes.

In one of our sessions, we watched a presentation entitled "Everyday Creativity" by photographer Dewitt Jones. The major theme was that everyone of us can look at the ordinary and see the extra-ordinary. His key points were: 1) perspective – put on the right lens to look at a problem or at life; learn to change your lens; 2) there is more than one right answer – don't stop at the first right answer but look for the next right answer; 3) problems are opportunities – risk making a mistake, because mistakes can be turned into learnings; 4) reevaluate patterns and systems – breaking the patterns may lead to new ways of doing better; 5) look for the place of most potential – and this takes time and

"Holy Baptism is especially appropriate at the Easter Vigil, on the Day of Pentecost, on All Saint's Day or the Sunday after All Saint's Day, the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord, (the first Sunday after Epiphany.) It is recommended that, as far as possible, baptisms be reserved for these occasions or when a bishop is present." The Book of Common Prayer, page 312.

The Baptismal dates for St. James in 2009 are: the Easter Vigil, Saturday, April 11, Sunday, April 26, Bishop Powell's annual visitation; Sunday May 31, Pentecost; Sunday, November 1, All Saints Day. ### Our Worth Comes from God, Not Money

In many congregations, talking about money is taboo. That we don't talk about money doesn't mean we don't worry about it, though. In fact, most Americans worry about it constantly. Are we saving enough? Will Social Security be there for us when we are old? Will the nursing home costs for our

aging parents clean us out just in time to prevent us from sending our children to college? And now, how will the mortgage lending crisis and the sharp declines in stock values affect me and my family?

Many people keep such worries to themselves or share them only with their spouses. Sometimes we turn to a coworker for understanding, but rarely to a pastor or to the church and its members.

One of the best ways people can be the church together in a money-dominated age is to break the taboo against discussing money and money worries. If we are concerned with having enough money to care for others or ourselves, or with meeting payments, let's confess those concerns to our brothers and sisters in a supportive setting. A burden confessed is a burden shared.

Congregations of Christians can do other things to counter the power of money in our lives. The church's ministry to its members is not merely problem-centered. We can also tell the stories of our lives in less materialistic ways. If we truly believe that life is more than bread and water (and clothing, houses, and cars), then the church must be the institution that validates our nonmaterial values. How? By telling the stories of the generous saints in our midst.

The people of God know something that others don't. They know that their worth comes from God and not from money—not from money earned, hoarded, spent to purchase things, or used to exercise power. Once people see this truth, they can see that they have things going for them, for they are gifted with an abundance of skills and stories, with opportunities for love and service, and with one another. The people of God know that they have things money cannot buy; they know they are rich in things of the soul. The job of the contemporary congregation is, as always, to increase love and understanding of God and love toward the neighbor. Lest money stand in the way of love, congregations must become places where the abundant gifts of God to the people of God become known and celebrated.

### The New Normal

"In reaffirming the greatness of our nation, we understand that greatness is never given. It must be earned. Our journey has never been one of shortcuts or settling for less. It has not been the path for the faint-hearted - for those who prefer leisure over work, or seek only the pleasures of riches and fame. Rather, it has been the risk-takers, the doers, the makers of things - some celebrated but more often men and women obscure in their labor, who have carried us up the long, rugged path towards prosperity and freedom."

-- Excerpt from President Barack Obama's inaugural address.

These words have specific poignancy at this point in our nation's history. Now more than ever we, citizens of the United States, need two things: a financial reality check and words of encouragement.

First, the reality-check. Much has been written these past several weeks of the current economic challenges. It would appear the new favorite past-time of financial pundits is predicting just how long it will be before our economy returns to "normal". Although I haven't checked, I suspect Las Vegas book-makers have established odds on the date the economy finally moves off life-support and begins to grow again.

But what exactly is the "normal" that the experts keep referring to? After all, look where that got us - unprecedented home foreclosures, mountains of credit card debt, a negative savings rate and alarming rates of financial illiteracy. Whatever their

"normal" is, I'm quite sure I don't want to go back any time soon.

On that note, I have one reality-check recommendation for President Obama and the new Congress - pass and fund legislation that requires every high school student in America to take a personal finance course. Don't wait for the states to pass it one-by-one. Do it in one fell swoop. We will all (youth, adults, communities, non-profits and corporations) be so much better for it. Youth today must know the fundamentals of basic money management. And if it plays out as I believe it will, they will pull their parents along for the ride - the financial literacy ride that is.

Next, a few words of encouragement. I've chatted with several people since last fall who've told me they haven't drastically altered their spending habits. How, you may ask, is that possible? Because most said they were already living within their means - a goal that is attainable if you link your values (e.g. your money philosophy) to your 2009 money plan.

Everyone agrees we are in uncharted economic waters. But living under a rock and hoping things change for the better will likely yield more of the same - fear and anxiety. The best medicine for this economic environment is to rebalance our money habits, to make sure they adequately reflect our values - not those of the hyper-consumer culture, and then to go on about our business of sharing, saving and spending. Only then will we be able to change course for a brighter economic future.

While it may take some time to find your new "normal", when you do, it will likely yield very positive results - both for you and our country.

Charting a course for the new "normal" can and will be a very positive step forward. Even though it might mean letting go of some old money habits (e.g. living beyond your means) my hope is that you will find it to be a very cathartic experience.

1. Use the Money In, Money Out<sup>a</sup>  [<http://sharesavespend.cmail1.com/t/y/l/dilyit/tju\\_dhkdul/j>](http://sharesavespend.cmail1.com/t/y/l/dilyit/tju_dhkdul/j) worksheet to track your monthly income and expenses.
2. Establish an emergency fund (goal: 3 - 6 months of expenses). This will minimize your anxiety and maximize your options in the event of a job transition.
3. Create a plan for paying down/off any high interest credit card debt.
4. Thoughtfully consider if you are saving and

sharing enough of your money. While it's important to shore-up your balance sheet, it's also important to share with those who are struggling to survive.

5. Stay the course. The best strategy for maintaining the new "normal" is to track your monthly progress.

When it comes to money, what one thing would you like to do more of in 2009?

## Vestry Corner

What is a Vestry? Most Episcopalians would say that the Vestry is the governing body of the local congregation of the Episcopal Church. This is so, and it has specific responsibilities that are set out by the National and Diocesan Constitution & Canons. Though the Vestry has some similarities to a board of directors, it is different in that a parish is a covenant community and Vestry members practice a servant leadership. The success of a congregation is not measured in terms of numbers of members or size of the endowment, but rather in the degree to which it is working toward the fulfillment of the mission of the Church. Specific responsibilities of the Vestry include:

- help to define and articulate the mission of the congregation;
- support the mission by word and deed;
- select and support the rector
- ensure effective organization and planning;
- ensure adequate resources in leadership and in financial stewardship
- manage resources effectively
- determine that appropriate programs, policies, and procedures have been developed and are followed;
- assess its own performance; and
- provide spiritual leadership to lead the congregation in the mission of the Church “to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ (BCP p.855)

Congregations today often participate in a “shared ministry” where the clergy and laity function as part of an interdependent team and seek to engage a large number of people in a variety of leadership roles. Leading a congregation in an increasingly secular world is difficult and requires the support and efforts of many. Its foundation is a faithful dependence on God’s guidance and power. Your Vestry is an important part of the ministry team and looks forward to hearing your thoughts and idea. As Saints of James we are all responsible for sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ and participating in the mission and ministry of St. James, with God’s help.

**February 8<sup>th</sup>, Noon**, “The Greening of your Faith.” by Michael Bentley. Along with the presentation, a soup and sandwich lunch will be served for \$3.00 a person.

**February 15<sup>th</sup>, 9:00 am**, “Science & Faith: Darwin 150 years later,” by Michael Bentley. This session will examine Darwin’s original insight, the science now, and how evolutionary theory has informed our theology of creation today.

**February 22<sup>nd</sup>, 9:00 am**, “Prince Among Slaves-Part I”, a PBS DVD tells the amazing true story of Abdul Rahman Ibrahim Sori, an African prince enslaved in the American South. In 1788, the slave ship *Africa* set sail from the Gambia River, its hold laden with a profitable but highly perishable cargo-hundreds of men, women, and children bound in chains, headed for American shores. Eight months later, a handful of survivors found themselves for sale in Natchz, Mississippi. One of them, a 26 year African prince, endured the humiliation of slavery without ever losing his dignity or hope for freedom.

### The Rector’s Lenten Book Study

The land of Israel is located at the eastern end of the Mediterranean Sea and serves as a bridge between Africa and Asia. Old Testament scholar, W. Eugene March has written *God’s Land On Loan, Israel, Palestine, and the World*, which develops a theology of land, contending that since the world belongs to God, we do not “own” land. Rather, land is a loan from God, and we must use it responsibly and justly. This book examines the relationship between Israel and the Palestinian people, rehearsing both the

history of that relationship and its influence on today's conflict.

This book will be on sale in the Parish Hall for \$15.00. The discussion group for those who can attend, will meet on Wednesdays in Lent, March 4, 11, 18, 25, April 1, at 3:30 pm in the Parish Hall.
